Dorothy Cotton Jubilee Singers Rock at Carnegie Hall

It is probably the dream of any musician to perform on stage at Carnegie Hall. But nothing can prepare one for the feeling of stepping out on the stage in the Isaac Stern Auditorium, seeing the ranks of seats in the multiple balconies, and hearing that first reverberating chord from the walls of what must be one of the most acoustically-perfect performance spaces in the country or, perhaps, the world. Fortunately, the Dorothy Cotton Jubilee Singers (DCJS) were able to get that initial reaction of "Wow!" out of the way in a final rehearsal a few hours before their debut performance Saturday evening, March 19 with the Fisk Jubilee Singers at Carnegie.

More than a year's planning, organizing, fund-raising, and rehearsing culminated in Auditorium at Carnegie Hall. an outstanding choral performance in the

fabled Isaac Stern Auditorium at Carnegie Hall in New York City. The DCJS chorus joined the Fisk Jubilee Singers and several other smaller groups to perform a program of Negro Spirituals under the direction of Dr. Paul Kwami, Director of the Fisk Singers. The group also sang My God is a Rock with a small chorus composed entirely of DCJS singers and soloist Maria Ellis-Jordan under the direction of DCJS Artistic Director, Dr. Baruch Whitehead. The emotion and energy of this piece brought the enthusiastic audience, estimated to number more than 1500, to its feet in a standing ovation.

A total of 74 DCJS members, including Dr. Whitehead and Associate Director Emily Preston, made the trip. In addition to Dr. Whitehead and Ms. Preston, FBC members Anne Farrell, Bill Fry, and Dave Caughey participated in the concert. The organization of the trip, including the coordination of hotel reservations, bus travel, and rehearsal schedules, both in-person and as Zoom-hybrids, was a massive effort, and the chorus members are so appreciative of Dr. Whitehead's vision, leadership, and organizational skills. It was truly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for all who participated.

As most of you know, First Baptist is the rehearsal home of the DCJS, and we are grateful for the flexibility that First Baptist allowed as the chorus successfully dealt with efforts to remain healthy during the COVID pandemic. All singers in the chorus were required to be vaccinated and boosted, and all were tested during the first rehearsal in the city; thankfully, all tests came back negative and everyone who made the trip to New York City was able to perform. 

April 18th Cabinet Meeting Highlights:

From the Treasurer:

- The month's end budget surplus for March was \$52,682.40, a healthy amount for this point in the year.
- Mission and Outreach budget expenditures were \$3,405.00, a bit more than 1/4 of the amount budgeted for the year.
- The annual total of \$1,005.00 was sent to the Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering.
- Almost \$6,000 was raised for Ukrainian relief through the One Great hour of Sharing and a Ukrainian Relief Fund.

Nominating Committee Members: Leslie Schultz agreed to chair the reor-

Leslie Schultz agreed to chair the reorganized committee that will include Tina Hilsdorf, Meg Gillard and Susan Eymann.

Pastor's Sabbatical: Andrea Mooney has agreed to be the coordinator for the Pastor's summer sabbatical. Amanda Ufford will substitute when Andrea is unavailable. Debbie Allen, Tony Lister and Rich Barron have agreed to assume responsibility for pastoral care during Debbie's absence.

All-church Retreat: Plans are underway for an all-Church retreat after Debbie returns.

Boiler Project Update (Anne Farrell):


New high efficiency boilers would cost double their original estimate, or from \$60,000 – \$75,000. Heat pumps would cost from \$150,000 to \$180,000. A hybrid solution would be to keep the old boiler going and put in the heat pumps in stages: \$45,000 - \$60,000 per project. The Trustees seemed most intrigued by this possibility that would reduce dependence on fossil fuels while converting, over time, from a gas-driven boiler. There will be a short update on what they learned at Adult Sunday School May 15th.

Update on Bylaws Revision: The first working draft of a proposed revision to the Bylaws is being reviewed by Bylaw Committee. The proposed revision of the Bylaws will be presented to the Congregation in the fall for discussion and discernment over a period of time.

Schedule: Adult Ed time (May 15th) is set aside for updates of sabbatical plans, Bylaw revisions and the boiler. The Spring/Summer annual Congregation meeting is set for June26th.

Ithaca Festival Parade: Theme of June 2nd parade is "Together Again." There was agreement that FBC should participate while keeping it simple. One suggestion was to carry our 200th Anniversary Banner and other banners.

Pollinator Pathway and Garden: The Green Team has signed up to participate in Pollinator Garden Pathways, a national movement to plant pollinator gardens. We are the first in Tompkins County.
