

Its mission is to oversee facilities, finances, and personnel. The Committee cares for the Church's physical assets, arranges for routine maintenance and repairs, plans and executes capital improvement projects.

SERVICE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE:

Its mission is to promote the flow of God's all-inclusive love through the Church and into the world. This Committee coordinates service, outreach, and actions to address social injustice and support needs within the local community and beyond.

WELCOME AND OUTREACH:

Its mission is to reach out, welcome, and introduce persons into FBC's community of faith. The Committee coordinates the Church's creative engagement within the larger community. It recruits and trains greeters/ ushers and coordinates visitor follow up in collaboration with the Pastor.

WORSHIP, MUSIC, & SPIRITUAL LIFE:

In collaboration with the Pastor and the music staff, its mission is to create rich worship experiences that inspire deeper spiritual connections. It arranges and sets-up monthly communion services and offers special programs that enhance the spiritual life of the Church.

Haba Na Haba Hujazu Kibaba

In a crowded Kenyan conference room my seatmate Irene taught me to say "Haba na haba hujaza kibaba," or "Little by little the pot gets filled," in Kiswahili. Each of us contributes something.

I had just presented on my research studying the impact of rural public libraries on social wellbeing (https://rurallibraries. org/findings-summary/) at a conference for school librarians in Kenya. I talked about the things that mattered (contribution and being connected) to rural American inhabitants

we interviewed. Primarily though, I listened. The Kenyans I spoke with had a deep understanding of social wellbeing and communities and I was eager to learn. In fact, I changed my presentations ("School Libraries and Social Wellbeing," "Raising Readers," "Communicating the Value of School Libraries") once I was in Kenya and had talked to Kenyans. I realized my content was not applicable to the library experiences of the conference attendees.

I had been invited with three other Americans to speak at the first Knowledge Empowering Youth (KEY) Libraries (https://keylibraries.org/) conference. We joined librarians, school administrators, politicians, and library leaders from across Kenya in Nairobi for three days. I have never been to a conference where every participant attended every session. I was struck by the palpable sense of belonging. During the tea break, everyone immediately fell into lively conversation and strangers quickly became friends. Each person cared about the lives of those around them, and let one another know they mattered. I found the individual travel mug I brought with me, a stark and lonely contrast to the collective nature embedded in Kenyan culture and the daily sharing of tea.

Before and after the conference, Nyakundi Nyambane, Director of KEY Libraries, guided Andrew, me, and the other Americans throughout the country. We visited school libraries in a variety of settings and did some touristy things along the way.

In a remote Maasai village on the Masai Mara wildlife preserve Andrew was honored as an elder with a small beaded club called a rungu. We saw zebra, giraffes, elephants, and rhinos up close, and a sleepy lioness in a tree a comfortable distance away. We visited Lamu, an island on the coast, its old architecture reminiscent of North Africa. In the library I sat down with a group of girls who described the lego robots that they were working on. At sunset we ate dinner on a traditional sailboat only to discover an even more elaborate dinner awaited us on the rooftop of the home where we were staying. In the morning, before sunrise, we were awakened to the Muslim call to prayer.

Eldoret is the high altitude home of the best distance runners in the world. There we walked through a tea field and the barn yard that sustains the school, to peek over the fence at Eliud Kipchoge's (marathon world record holder until last year) training facility. Afterwards we drove for hours down a twisty road along the side of a spectacular rift valley to visit a small village. Its library in a shipping container. We were honored with a large meal, songs and dances, gifts, speeches, and each of us planted a tree.

We marveled at a Nairobi high school library that was as large and much nicer than my college's library. Each village and school were different but the generosity and hospitality of our Kenyan hosts was

evident everywhere. The greeting karibu means welcome. On our last night our host and my friend Nyakundi invited Andrew and me to his home for a meal. To meet his family and share a meal was an incredible honor and my favorite part of the trip.

I often think back to my time in Kenya. When things feel overwhelming and the weight of everything seems too massive to carry, I think about "Haba na haba hujaza kibaba" little by little the pot gets filled. I cannot do everything, but can do something. I can do that next right thing. If other people are doing that next right thing along side of me, eventually the pot will get filled.


