

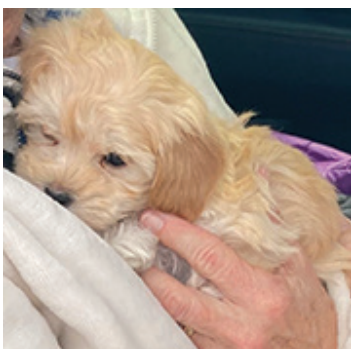

Hallelujah, Hallelujah!

The glorious singing of the Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* by the FBC choir, augmented with congregational voices, was a fitting climax to poignant Holy Week services at First Baptist that were suffused with exquisite music, meditation and prayer

On Palm Sunday, April 13th, the choir, under the direction of Choir Director Belinda Adams, sang the spiritual *Ain't No Rock Going to Shout for Me* based on "the rocks will cry out" from Luke 19:40. Organist/Pianist Christopher Morgan Loy played *Piano Piece in Ab* by Franz Liszt for the offertory and Pastor Debbie Bennett Reynolds preached on "Empowered to Praise and to Love."

Over 45 gathered in the Community Room on Maundy Thursday for a delicious simple supper organized by the Hospitality Committee that included a selection of eight soups, bread and cheese. The meal was followed by Tony Lister playing Antonin Dvorák's *Goin' Home* theme on the shakuhachi to transition to a short worship service in which folks shared communion with one another at their respective tables

The powerful Good Friday Tenebrae service left congregants spellbound as they

silently left the darkened sanctuary after the Christ candle was extinguished. Again, stunning music enhanced the service. It included a duet *Were You There* by Tony Lister (saxophone) and Christopher Morgan Loy (piano), and the choir's anthem *Take My Mother Home* with a solo by Kris Scott.

The singing of familiar hymns *Christ the Lord is Risen Today*, *Thine is the Glory*, and *Christ is Risen, Shout Hosanna*, together with the choral anthem *Ain't No Grave* and Christopher's offertory from Bach Suite #6, set the stage for Pastor Debbie's memorable Easter message "Practice Resurrection; Be a Good Neighbor Church." Then, as a finale, Handel's wondrous *Hallelujah Chorus* enthralled all. Folks then moved into the Community Room for a copious Easter brunch, again organized by the Hospitality Committee, while the youth enjoyed an Easter Egg Hunt outside.

April 5th Hands Off Rally Draws Ithaca Crowds And FBC Folk



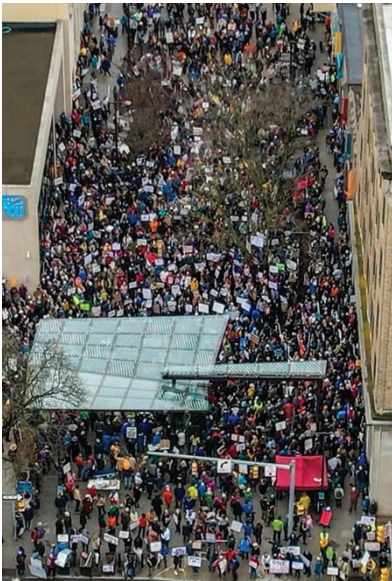

Folks came armed with posters and banners to express their frustration.

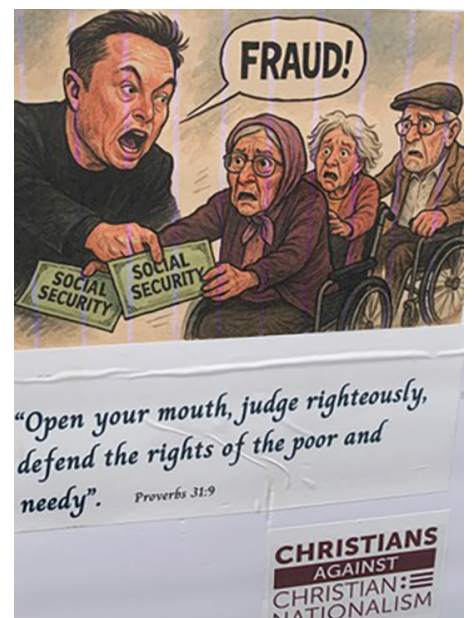

A 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, BPFNA~Bautistas por la Paz is a progressive, intercultural organization of peacemakers with a variety of personalities, ethnicities, cultures and interests. Gender-diverse, inclusive, and affirming, it is the first Baptist organization with a formal bilingual commitment.

BPFNA serves over 4,000 members in four member nations: Canada, the United States, Mexico, and Puerto Rico. They also accompany peacemakers in South America, the Caribbean, Europe, and Africa.

The BPFNA logo represents both peace and the Holy Spirit. The rainbow design reminds us of the beauty and diversity within creation.

Convinced that Jesus came not only for the transformation of individual lives, but also to empower the poor, liberate the oppressed, free the captive, and pronounce a new day of grace for all of creation, BPFNA acknowledges this message of liberation and reconciliation by striving to become an antiracist, intercultural, and decentralized organization with three areas of activity:

Ecological Justice Committee Calls for "Living Out Our Faith" By Buying Fair Trade Items

Did you know?

- Fair Trade is a global movement to empower farmers, fishers, workers, and their communities through equitable trade.
- The Fair trade system currently works with over 2 million farmers and workers.
- There are more than 1,900 Fair trade producer organizations across 70 countries.
- There are over 6,000 Fair trade products from coffee and tea to flowers and gold.
- Over 25% of all Fair trade farmers and workers are women. Fair trade standards are designed to ensure gender equality, increase female participation, and prohibit the use of child labor.

A goal of the FBC Ecological Justice Committee is to educate our congregation on the importance of using fairly sourced items such as coffee and chocolate. They don't want our church to lose its vision of living out our commitment to ecological justice by using products that are equitably sourced. Rather than perpetuating a problem that continues to keep farmers in poverty, look for the FAIR TRADE Mark on items when you shop.

To that end, Cindi Zorokong has created an outline for a Power Point presentation that can be used to educate the congregation. The Power Point explains the issue, tells what buying Fair Trade can mean, and offers suggestions for folks to adopt. It could be used as a jumping off point for future discussions and actions by individuals and the church.

In addition, Alice Grow is compiling information, and is creating a display for the small bulletin board in the Community Room. The poster below will be part of the display that you will be able to see in coming months.

King Ferry Food Pantry

Located at the Southern Cayuga High School Ag Wing, the King Ferry Food Pantry serves the many farm communities in that rural area. It offers canned and boxed food items, personal items, fresh produce, dairy, bread, bakery, snacks and frozen meats as available.

Tompkins County Immigrants Rights Coalition (TCIRC)

Since 2005 the Tompkins County Immigrant Rights Coalition (TCIRC) (<http://tcimmigrants.com>) has supported immigrants in the community and advocates for comprehensive immigration reform.

Its goals include:

- Working closely with immigrants to assess their needs and develop strategies to address their concerns;
- Providing leadership training and resources for migrant communities and non-citizens to advocate for themselves;
- Bringing awareness to the broader public about the effects of immigration policy among non-citizen communities;
- Educating noncitizens about their rights, how to prepare for possible arrests and detentions, and how to navigate the detention and deportation systems;
- Developing informed community support for detained migrants and non-citizens who are arrested, detained and in court.

An Exploration of Contemporary Migration* by local film maker Thomas Hoebbel. Following the film, Mr. Hoebbel entertained questions and led a discussion about the genesis and evolution of the film.

Donations for the event came from Wegmans, Remembrance Farm, Wide Awake Bakery, Trumansburg Main Street Market, Green Star and a generous anonymous donor. Proceeds of over \$3,000 from the event went directly to farmworkers through the King Ferry Food Pantry and farmworkers advocates (TCIRC).

Highlights of April 21st FBC Council Meeting

Excerpt from Council Minutes compiled

ABC/USA Biennial at Omaha, NE: Alicia Dixon-Garrard has agreed to attend the biennial and serve as our delegate. We will vote on Alicia at a special and very brief Congregational meeting on Sunday May 18th. We agreed that the church could provide \$500 toward her expenses.

ABC/RGR Grant Opportunity: Our ABC Rochester-Genesee region has received a \$1.2 million dollar grant from the Lilly Foundation for up to 30 congregations to explore new ways to thrive and minister in a post-pandemic 21st Century world. Applications for a second cohort of RGR churches are due May 1. There is already a first cohort of six churches participating in the "Thriving Churches" program. Anne Farrell provided more details about the program and council members also received an email with information about the program. The consensus of the Council was that the May 1 deadline for the second cohort is too soon for us to pull together a required steering committee of 3 to 5 people. We agreed to work toward recruiting a steering committee of 3 to 5 people who would apply in January 2026 to be part of a third cohort. We discussed how to publicize this opportunity to our members. We also discussed possible areas of focus we might like to explore with grant monies (\$28,000), should we receive them.

Ithaca Festival Parade: The parade is Thursday, May 29. Judy Kennison is hoping some people can be recruited to build a float or something besides walking with signs and banners.

Steve Farrell will deal with the parade application.

General Secretary Gina Jacobs-Strain Leads American Baptist Churches USA

The General Secretary of our denomination is the highest staff officer of the American Baptist Churches USA. On November 4, 2023, Reverend Dr. Gina C. Jacobs-Strain was called as General Secretary of American Baptist Churches USA by the Board of General Ministries. Her service in this role began on February 1, 2024.

Rev. Dr. Jacobs-Strain earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology from Rutgers University and graduated Magna Cum Laude with a Master of Divinity degree from Drew University's Theological School. She was also honored with the Old Testament Studies Scholar Award from the Biblical Studies Department. She received a Certificate of Excellence from Palmer Theological Seminary & ABC-NJ Academy, and successfully completed the Nehemiah-Leadership Program. In May 2020, she attained a Doctor of Ministry from Duke University.

Her devotion to the Lord began during her elementary school years when she committed her life to Christ. She has served as Executive Director of American Baptist Women's Ministries (ABWM) for six years where, under her guidance, ABWM introduced the AB GIRLS program, "Building Bridges and Gateways to Girl's Future/Hie-STEAM," an initiative connecting AB GIRLS Christian Curriculum with local STEAM providers. The program empowers girls to recognize God's creative potential within them. ABWM has also broadened its Beloved Community and Domestic Violence ministries and now offers seminars and webinars tailored for young adult women nationwide.

Dr. Jacobs-Strain has held various other pastoral roles including Transitional Pastor at First Baptist Church of New Market in Piscataway, N.J., Interim Pastor at St. Paul Baptist Church in Atlantic Highlands, N.J., Associate Regional Pastor for Women in Ministry for American Baptist Churches of New Jersey (ABC-NJ), and serves as an Associate Minister of Christian Education at St. Paul Baptist Church in Montclair, N.J.

She has served as a guest speaker, preacher, workshop leader and Bible study leader for ABWM regions, ABC regions and ABCUSA. She has also been a guest preacher/lecturer at institutions such as Drew University Theological School, New Brunswick Theological Seminary, and ABC-NJ Academy. She contributed to the "Testify: ABC-NJ Devotional" book, co-launched the Christian Education Workshop Series, "Leading Interactive and Engaging Bible Studies (L.I.B.S. TM)" at the ABC-NJ annual Church Officers and Leaders Conference (COAL) and initiated a conversation series for clergy, "The Intersection of Leadership and Healing." Most recently, on April 10, 2025, she delivered the annual Bauer-Broholm Lecture at Andover Newton Seminary at Yale Divinity School's Bicentennial Celebration. gina.jacobs-strain@abc-usa.org

Tree Chosen to Plant in Pollinator Garden

After much consultation between Louise Mudrak, Sarah Zipfel and Alice Grow, a tree species was chosen to plant in the south end of the FBC Pollinator Garden. Sarah and Alice found a very nice *Carpinus caroliniana*, or American Hornbeam tree for the garden at the Plantsmen Nursery in Lansing.

Native to Midwestern forests, the American hornbeam is a small tree with a wide-spreading, flat-topped crown, and slender stems. The ultimate mature size is approximately 30' tall by 20' wide but may grow larger under optimum conditions. American hornbeam bark is smooth, gray to bluish-gray, and fluted, giving the tree a distinctive "musclewood" appearance. It will be planted soon when we have a truck and a couple of strong people to help.
