Bill Fry: Vietnam Diary Bill Fry, Cornell Professor Emeritus of Plant

Bill Fry, Cornell Professor Emeritus of Plant Pathology was invited to be a Fulbright scholar in Vietnam in late November/December 2019. Below are excerpts from his letters home.

The second week in December was "typical." I made two presentations (one on Tuesday and the other on Thursday). Interacting with students has been a lot of fun. Xuan, head of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry and Selina, a new faculty member, are my interpreters.

I've had to make the power-point presentations as easy as possible and I cannot convey any complicated ideas. I'd never thought about how some ideas are complicated, and that is requires expert knowledge of English to be able to convey or receive those ideas. I'm really working on Simplicity. However, I was able to engage and interact with the students – even through interpreters. I presented some of my favorite ideas in plant pathology and the students did understand them. I presented pictures and asked them to describe what they saw. From their observations we (they) could come to some conclusions. I think they enjoyed it. I've used examples of late blight and also Fusarium wilt.

Tuesday night was fun. I had heard that the Vietnamese women had won gold medals at the Southeast Asia games in the Philippines on Saturday night and that the men were in the soccer finals on Tuesday night. I told Thang that I'd like to go someplace and watch the game. He said okay, and he took me to the home of one of his friends where his entire group came to eat and watch the game. It was a privilege to be included. They all sat on the floor, but were nice to the old American and let me sit on a chair. The food was delicious and the participants were all happy and very nice to me. Vietnam won the game, and then there erupted pandemonium on the streets. People were really excited and happy. This game was Vietnam's first championship ever in men's soccer in these games.

Lunch on the day of the rose planting was super. It was a party for Xuan and his students (who are now teachers and administrators) at area schools. The Vietnamese have a tradition of "inviting" people. There is a bowl of some type of alcohol (nearly tasteless). They call it "wine", but it is a distilled beverage. Someone at the table can invite someone or some persons or the whole table. That means that you toast everyone, drink the "wine" and then shake hands with everyone. There is a lot of "inviting." It was great to see Xuan's former students come to our table and "invite" him. By the end of "lunch" everyone was very happy





We saw Fusarium wilt of tomato both in the greenhouse and in the field, and I used photos from both sites when talking about Fusarium wilt. In the upper picture the plant in front of the boy in the blue shirt was wilting badly. Below we are in a tomato field. The farmer has the blue hat. The plants in the row between the students and me are dead or dying from a severe wilt (maybe Fusarium wilt). Xuan is the guy in the blue jacket on the right side of the photo. It was fun to use these photos to talk about Fusarium wilt in the class. The same students in the field are also in the class



Friday was quite a nice day. I was invited to go with Xuan and several others to Sa Pa. The university has a project to interact with many area high schools and Xuan was working on a garden at a school in Sa Pa. He had prepared the area, with good soil in raised beds in a nice design. He had loaded a truck full of roses in the morning and then we drove up to Sa Pa. The town may be the most famous of tourist towns in Vietnam. It is at the foot of a mountain (>10,000 ft) which is the highest mountain in Southeast Asia. I even saw a couple Americans (or Europeans) there. The students were happily engaged in removing the roses from the truck preparing to plant them after lunch.

Church Year Ends 2019 with Small Surplus

Due to an unexpected (and significant) December donation in the Anticipated Regular Giving category, income in 2019 exceeded the budgeted value by \$2,124.59, while disbursements exceeded budgeted values by only \$1,267.45, resulting in a year-end surplus of \$857.14. Hallelujah!

In the Property and Maintenance budget we were able to pay the Presbyterian Church this year's installment on the parking lot paving costs, as well as put into escrow more than \$2,900 to pay the equipment cost for the burglar alarm system the Trustees expect to install in January. Expenditures from the Service Supply & Equipment line included \$625 for the cleaning of the carpet in the sanctuary.

Personnel expenditures for the year were more than \$1,300.00 less than budgeted, due to lower than expected expenditures in the Conference and Professional Expenses lines and Employment Insurance. The aggregate of the Education expenditures fell below estimates by approximately \$800.

While several lines in the Worship budget were over-subscribed, the aggregate expenditures were nearly \$600 less than budgeted, largely due to the fact that the Visiting Musicians line of \$500 was not spent.

The Ithaca College Protestant Community no longer exists in that form, so that \$250 was not spent, and the Congregational Projects/Local Needs line spent about \$1,100.00 less than budgeted, leaving a surplus of just over \$1,300. in the Mission and Outreach budget.

A total of \$1,233.00 was collected for the Retired Ministers and Missionaries Fund of the ABC this year. And the final payment was made to Arlen Vernava for his leadership of the Visioning process.
